Course Description

This class will introduce the concept of natural resources by studying topics such as land, soil, rangeland, forest, water, atmosphere, minerals, and energy. The management, use, and environmental impacts associated with these resources will also be studied. Emphasis will be placed on the United States within the context of the global environment.

Course Outcomes

- What are natural resources and how do we use them?
- How has our use of natural resources changed over time?
- How does the use of natural resources impact our environment?
- Apply scientific principles to make informed decisions about resource use
- Recognize and act on essential components of academic integrity
- Examine students' perspectives of how they fit into the world community
- Examine students' responsibility as stewards of the environment
- Identify important connections between human and resource use
- Become proficient at integrating and apply skills learned to everyday life
- Demonstrate awareness of how natural resource use impacts their daily lives
